## The מִשְׁכָּן (1)

Write each Hebrew word into script

Hashem instructed the Jewish People to construct the Mishkan when they were travelling in the desert after leaving Egypt. **This was to be the home of Hashem's Presence, the 'Shechinah' (שְׁכִינָה), on earth.**

מִשְׁכָּן

The מִשְׁכָּן was set up whenever the Jewish People encamped and taken down before they continued on their way. Sacrifices, קִרְבָּנוֹת, were offered to ה' in the Mishkan. It was used throughout the forty years in the wilderness and was also used in different places in Eretz Yisrael until the First Temple (בֵּית הַמִּקְדָּשׁ) was built in Yerushalayim by Shlomo HaMelech (King Solomon).

**The Ohel Moed, the Tent of Assembly, was the main area of the Mishkan.** It was divided into two rooms. The back room was called the Kodesh HaKodashim (קֹדֶשׁ הַקְּדוֹשִׁים), the 'Holy of Holies.' This contained the Aron HaKodesh. (see below)

אהל-מועד

The front room was called the Kodesh, or 'Holy.' It contained the Menorah, Shulchan (Table of the Showbread), and the Golden Altar.

**The Holy of Holies contained the Aron Hakodesh, (אָרוֹן הַקְּדוֹשׁ), Holy Ark, the most holy of the articles in the Mishkan.** (see below)  
Only the Kohen Gadol, High Priest, could enter the Kodesh HaKodashim, and only on Yom Kippur.

קֹדֶשׁ הַקְּדוֹשִׁים

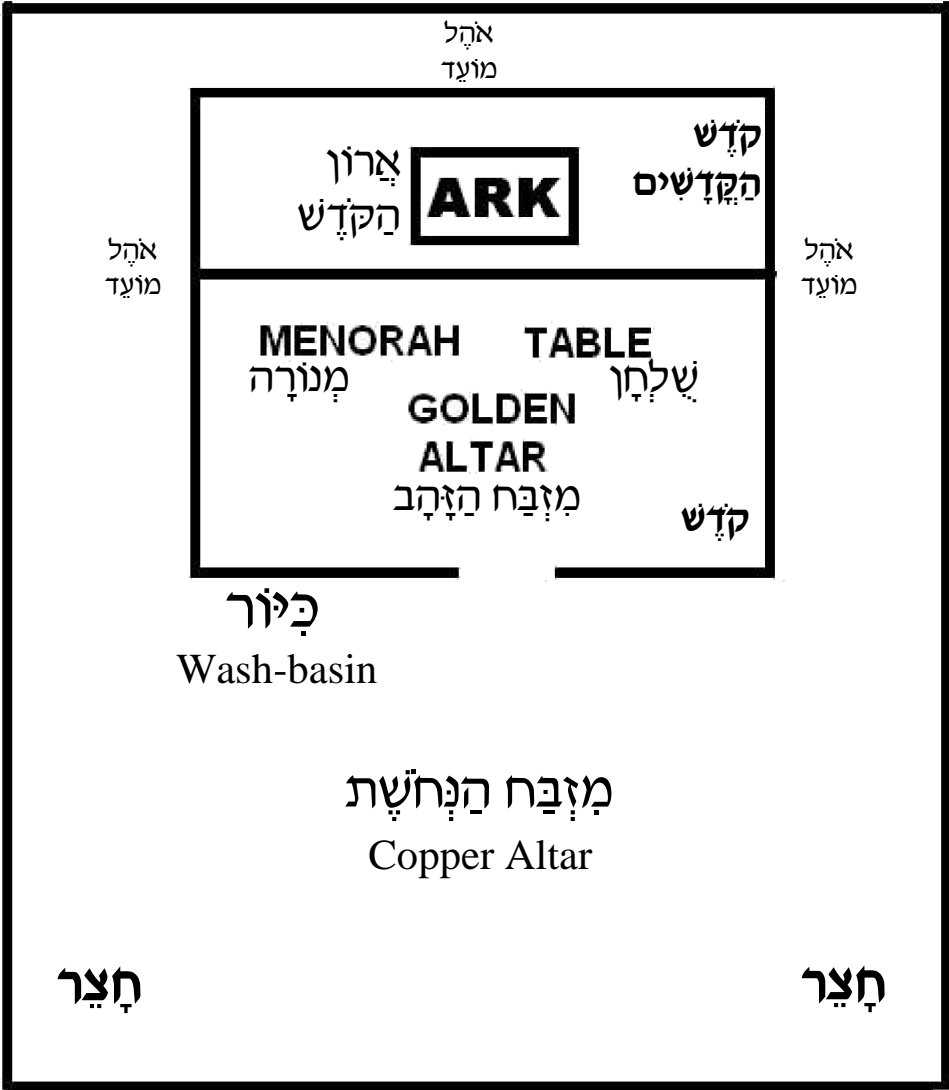
The אָרוֹן הַקְּדוֹשׁ, Holy Ark, was in the קֹדֶשׁ הַקְּדוֹשִׁים.  
**This contained the two tablets (לְחוֹת) upon which the Ten Commandments were engraved, and the Sefer Torah.**
